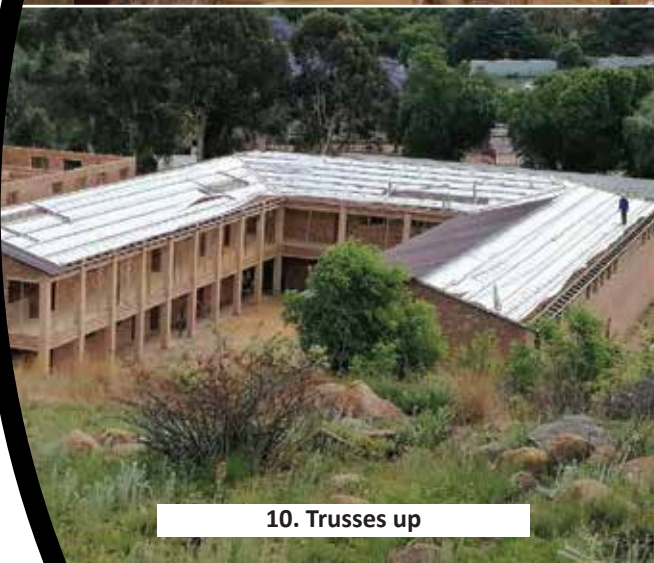

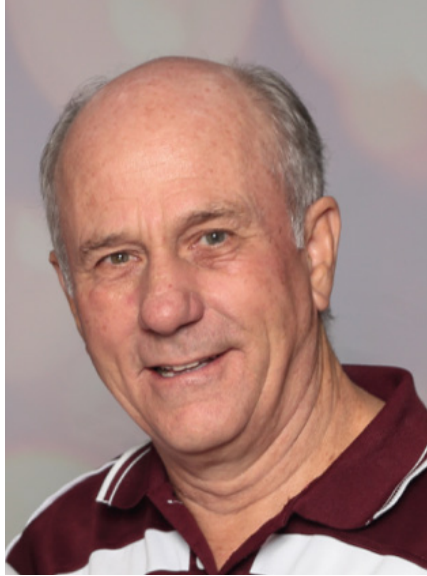

Message from Pastor John

At Calvary Christian College we can recall great times, good times and then simply grand times. These remind me of marathon runners: they enjoy the good times – every time a milestone passes, it is one kilometer further from the start and one kilometer closer to the end. The great times are like the feeding stations along the way – after many kilometers you come to a feeding station to take on water or Coke or something to eat – you feel refreshed and away you go. Then there are the grand times when the race starts, the people you pass and have a chat to, or before you get overtaken, people talk to you and ask how you're doing and then of course there is the greatest moment of all when you cross the finish line.

Some great times have been the growing of the school and watching the growth of the learners from little ones to big strapping young men and pretty young women, from one grade to the next, year on year and when they leave they are ready to take Jesus to the world. The good times are things like the events we've had that showcase the school and the Lord Jesus whom we serve: events such as the fashion shows in the early days, moving onto our present property, Mr and Miss Calvary at Southgate, buying properties around us for the school, the opening of the Futsal court and establishing the Early Childhood Development Center.

Now... grand moments are rare and rightly so. These include moments such moving onto our current property in 1994, as the opening of the high school in 2006 and our first matriculants writing in 2010, the growth of the school from 0 when we started, to 400 in all grades. The fantastic leaders we have produced and the teachers who have served all our learners so well over the years, enabling us to produce matriculants with a 100% pass over the past 12 years.

BUT... more importantly the greatest moments are those where we have seen our God honour His promises to us, always provide for us and always ensure that He will take up residence in any of our learners who are willing to, in humility, ask Him into their lives. Now we stand at another of our greatest moments in the history of the school as in 2024, the high school buildings will open to new learners for the first time. Our great Lord Jesus Christ has proved again that He is faithful and has been gracious to us. The glory belongs to Him and Him alone.

THE NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDINGS – ALL GLORY TO GOD

From humble beginnings, utilizing area behind the curtain on the stage in the boxing gym in Booyens, to occupying the passages and rooms in a pleasure resort to growing numerically and in structures on our own property, to now having three separate areas that house the ECD center, the primary school and at last the high school. It is in many ways a complete school accommodating kids from 3-4 years old to matric.

The contract to start building the high school was signed with Keswa Construction in August 2022. The company promised that the structure would be complete by August 2023. However, with the heavy rains over the December 2022 and January 2023 period, the contract was extend to the end of October 2023 to have the structure complete. From the end of October until mid-way through December the internal fittings, roads and paving, IT infrastructure, the painting and paving needed to be done. We are ready for 2024 and it is a miracle- to say the least!

Our thanks to our Lord Jesus Christ for all He has done for us. The school is a testimony to You. May it produce learners who love and fear Your name.

To Mr Keswa and his team in the office and his construction team, we express our thanks. To our site manager, Pastor Sandile, thank you. Thanks to Pastor Chris for his advice and guidance on the project. To those who faithfully gave over the many years to see the project come into being, thank you. To the godly men and women who prayed for this school to be built, it is a result of those very prayers.

To Dr Mabaso, the Head of Compliance from the Department of Education, whose advice was timeous and of immeasurable value to us. Bless you.

To Ms Potgieter, our current principal, and all our present teachers – we stand on the shoulders of those who have gone before us in order to reach a goal you believed in by faith but, like Abraham, never saw come into being – we salute you.

To our ground staff, some of who have been with us for 20 years and more. Thank you for being loyal to our cause and remaining to see the learners become men and women of integrity.

To all our parents and grandparents, past and present: you dared to place you children in a Christian school when so many others committed their children into the hands of the world to educate. Thank you for entrusting them to us. Long may you live to see the fruits of your investment in their lives.

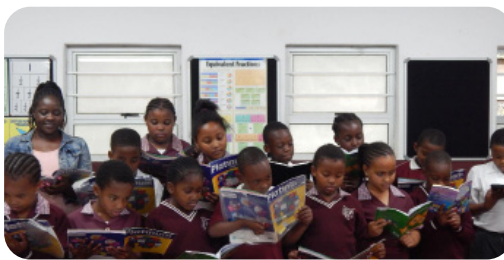


Exploring the World of Transport: Intermediate Phase Learners Take on the Museum and have a relaxing picnic at the Zoo!

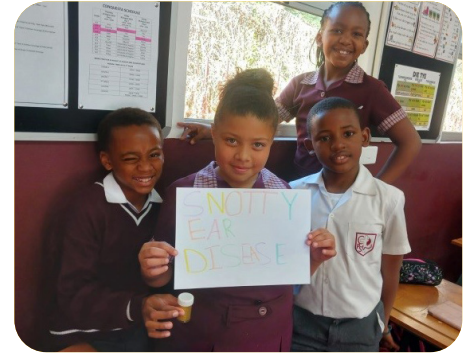

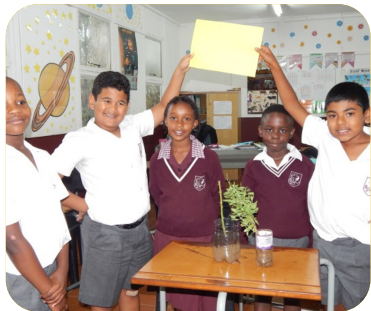

Broken Telephone Grade 5

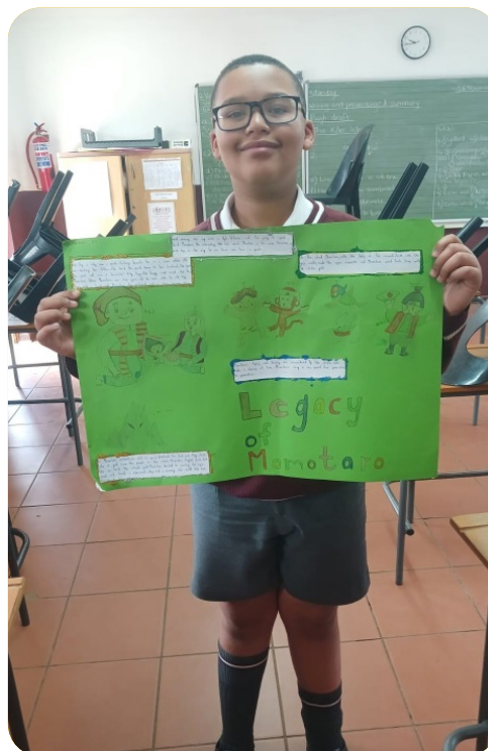

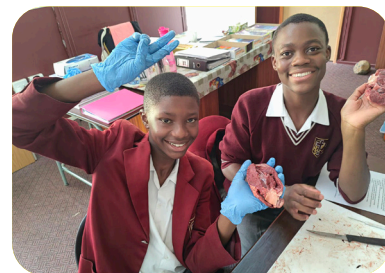

Mr Samuels talk on Malaria

A man by the name of Mr Samuels who apparently used to attend Calvary Christian College a long time ago, came to talk to us about Malaria and mosquitoes. He told us about how mosquitoes infect us with malaria. In fact I recall him telling us that mosquitoes don't carry malaria but a parasite which causes malaria once it enters our bodies. This parasite attaches itself to cells and once it reaches the liver it grows and reproduces itself causing the symptoms we get from malaria - our bodies signaling to us that something is wrong. The most interesting part of his talk was about the field he works in, studying mosquitoes' behavior as well as how they transmit malaria. He said that at first when he went to Wits he went to study medicine but then his professor gave the class projects to do. He had to choose which one to do and interestingly enough, he chose a project on mosquitoes. This pushed him to study further. Currently he works in lab trying to find ways to lessen the spread of malaria. Reducing the reproduction growth of mosquitoes is one method he mentioned that his lab and co-workers were working on.

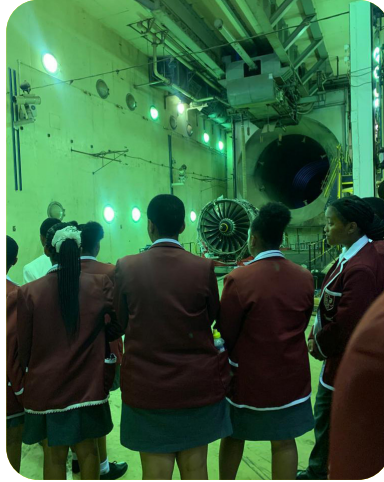

At the Hector Peterson memorial the red paint on the street represents the blood that was shed on that day. The waterfall represents the tears that will never end and the rocks in the water represent what the children used as their only weapons. The walls are stacked with stones that look like books on a shelf representing the education and the walls are different in height which shows the different age groups of the children.

According to the tour guide, Mbuyisa Makhubo, the young boy carrying Hector's mother said that if he had not taken Hector to the clinic he was not going to come into the house because it was his duty to pick up Hector and not just leave him lying in the street. Learning about that was really the highlight of my trip.

Grade 10 Life Science Molecule Practical

During a practical test in our Life Sciences class we were tasked with observing the reactions of various food items when mixed with different reagents.

As I approached the experiment, my initial assumption was that lemon juice would exhibit the most notable reaction due to its acidic nature. However, to ensure an unbiased approach, I reminded myself of the importance of considering all possibilities and not jumping to conclusions based solely on preconceived notions.

Following the experimental procedure, I observed that the potato and lemon juice indeed displayed substantial reactions with both the iodine and Benedict's solution. The potato turned black when mixed with iodine, indicating the presence of starch, while the lemon juice showed a colour change when mixed with Benedict's solution, indicating the presence of reducing sugars.

Reflecting on this experience, I realized the significance of conducting experiments and engaging in hands-on learning. It allowed me to challenge my initial assumptions and understand that the outcome of an experiment is not always predictable. It also reinforced the importance of exploring diverse perspectives and not relying solely on preconceived notions or popular beliefs.

In this context, the practical test served as a microcosm of the broader idea that a singular narrative can lead to ignorance. If I had only relied on my initial assumptions about lemon juice being the most reactive, I would have missed the opportunity to learn and discover the unique properties of the potato.

Through this experiment, I was able to explore the chemical properties of different foods and observe their reactions with specific reagents. It provided me with a hands-on understanding of how different substances interact and respond to certain chemical tests.

Practical tests like this offer valuable insights and promote scientific thinking. They allow us to apply theoretical knowledge to real-world scenarios and develop a deeper understanding of scientific concepts. By engaging in experiments and analyzing the results, we can draw meaningful conclusions and broaden our knowledge in the field.

Furthermore, such practical tests encourage critical thinking and problem-solving skills. By carefully selecting the reagents and foods, considering the expected reactions, and interpreting the outcomes, you were likely able to draw conclusions about the relative amounts of specific components present in the different foods.

Overall, engaging in practical tests enhance our understanding of scientific principles, foster curiosity, and develop critical thinking skills. By approaching experiments and learning opportunities with an open mind, we can challenge our assumptions, expand our understanding, and guard against ignorance.

‘...was an amazing experience, made lots of new friends.’ Tameekah Hendricks.

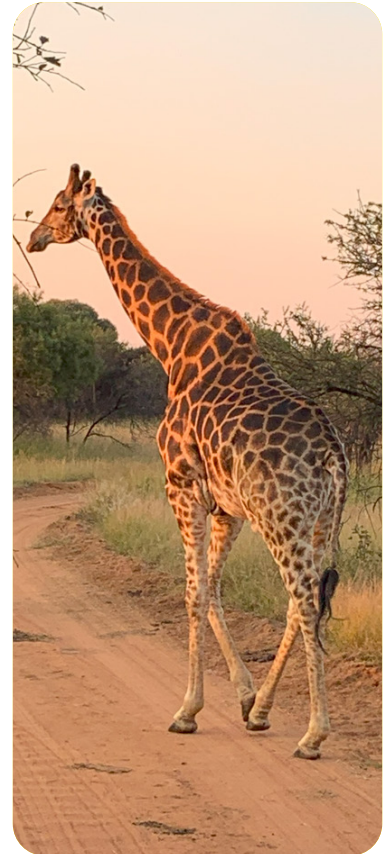
For our grade 12 learners camp was an opportunity ‘to ease the days of stress’ and ‘to take a short break from it all.’

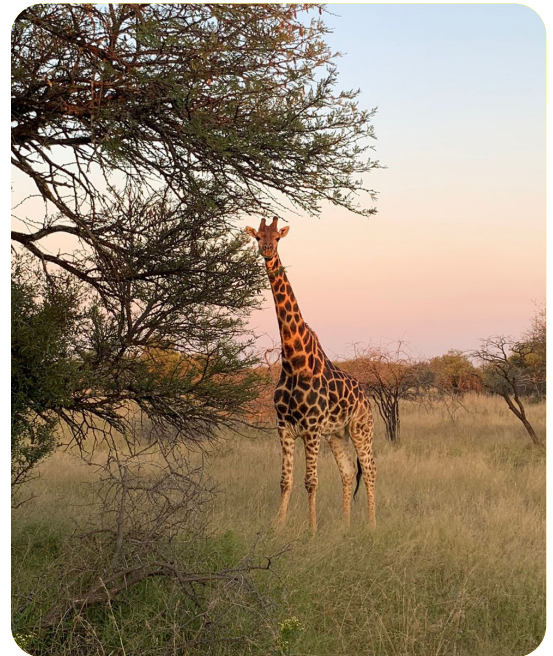

The creativity of the concepts produced by the learners was quite impressive. The winning works will be included in a calendar to be published by the sponsors.

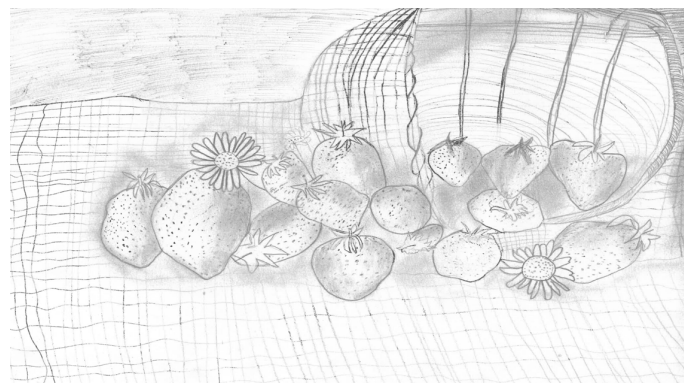
